1.15	ARTICLE 1
1.16	GENERAL EDUCATION
1.17	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 120A.41, is amended to read:
1.18	120A.41 LENGTH OF SCHOOL YEAR; HOURS OF INSTRUCTION.
1.19	A school board's annual school calendar must include at least 425 hours of instruction
1.20	for a kindergarten student without a disability, 935 hours of instruction for a student in
1.21	grades 1 though 6, and 1,020 hours of instruction for a student in grades 7 though 12, not
1.22	including summer school. The school calendar for all-day kindergarten must include at
1.23	least 850 hours of instruction for the school year. The school calendar for prekindergarten,
1.24	if offered by the district, must include at least 850 hours of instruction for the school year
1.25	and at least 200 hours of instruction for the summer. A school board's annual calendar
1.26	must include at least 165 days of instruction for a student in grades 1 through 11 unless a
1.27	four-day week schedule has been approved by the commissioner under section 124D.126.

- 2.1 EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective for the 2016-2017 school year and
 2.2 later.
- Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 122A.415, subdivision 1, is amended to read:
 Subdivision 1. Revenue amount. (a) A school district, intermediate school district,
 school site, or charter school that meets the conditions of section 122A.414 and submits an
 application approved by the commissioner is eligible for alternative teacher compensation
 revenue.
- (b) For school district and intermediate school district applications, the commissioner
 must consider only those applications to participate that are submitted jointly by a
 district and the exclusive representative of the teachers. The application must contain an
 alternative teacher professional pay system agreement that:
- 2.12 (1) implements an alternative teacher professional pay system consistent with
 2.13 section 122A.414; and
- 2.14 (2) is negotiated and adopted according to the Public Employment Labor Relations
 2.15 Act under chapter 179A, except that notwithstanding section 179A.20, subdivision 3, a
 2.16 district may enter into a contract for a term of two or four years.

 into the combination or consolidation. The commissioner may adjust the revenue computed
 for a site using prior year data to reflect changes attributable to school closings, school
 openings, or grade level reconfigurations between the prior year and the current year.

3.23	service agencies to ensure children have access to comprehensive services;
3.24	(9) coordination with all relevant school district programs and services, for example,
3.25	special education, homeless, and English learners;
3.26	(10) parent engagement strategies that include culturally and linguistically
3.27	responsive activities in prekindergarten through third grade;
3.28	(11) development and implementation of curriculum, assessment, and instructional
3.29	strategies aligned with the state's early learning guidelines and academic standards,
3.30	prekindergarten through third grade;
3.31	(12) inclusion of children with disabilities in the prekindergarten program;
3.32	(13) coordinated professional development and training for both school district and
3.33	community-based early learning providers that is informed by a measure of adult-child
3.34	interactions; and
3.35	(14) a plan for mixed delivery that may include partnerships with child care centers,
3.36	family child care programs licensed under section 245A.03 and Head Start programs that

4.29 observations, teacher judgment, parent recommendations, or developmentally appropriate

learner aid under section 124D.65, subdivision 5, if the pupil scored below the state cutoff 5.1 score or is otherwise counted as a nonproficient participant on the assessment measuring 5.2 the pupil's emerging academic English, or, in the judgment of the pupil's classroom 5.3 teachers, consistent with section 124D.61, clause (1), the pupil is unable to demonstrate 5.4 academic language proficiency in English, including oral academic language, sufficient to 5.5 successfully and fully participate in the general core curriculum in the regular classroom. 5.6 (c) Notwithstanding paragraphs (a) and (b), a pupil in kindergarten prekindergarten 5.7 through grade 12 shall not be counted as an English learner in calculating English learner 5.8 pupil units under section 126C.05, subdivision 17, and shall not generate state English 5.9 learner aid under section 124D.65, subdivision 5, if: 5.10

5.11 (1) the pupil is not enrolled during the current fiscal year in an educational program

(b) A prekindergarten pupil who is assessed but determined not to be disabled iscounted as the ratio of the number of hours of assessment service to 825 times 1.0.

(c) A kindergarten pupil with a disability who is enrolled in a program approvedby the commissioner is counted as the ratio of the number of hours of assessment and

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- education services required in the fiscal year by the pupil's individualized educationprogram to 875, but not more than one.
- 6.3 (d) A prekindergarten pupil who is not included in paragraph (a) or (b) is counted as
 6.4 0.5 pupil unit if the pupil is enrolled in a free all-day, every day prekindergarten program

For fiscal year 2015 and later, the basic revenue for each district equals the formula 6.21 allowance times the adjusted pupil units for the school year. The formula allowance for 6.22 fiscal year 2013 is \$5,224. The formula allowance for fiscal year 2014 is \$5,302. The 6.23 formula allowance for fiscal year 2015 and later is \$5,831. The formula allowance for 6.24 fiscal year 2016 is \$5,889. The formula allowance for fiscal year 2017 and later is \$5,948. 6.25

APPENDIX Repealed Minnesota Statutes: 15-2192

124D.15 SCHOOL READINESS PROGRAMS.

Subd. 3a. **Application and reporting requirements.** (a) A school readiness program provider must submit a biennial plan for approval by the commissioner before receiving aid under section 124D.16. The plan must describe how the program meets the program requirements under subdivision 3. A school district by April 1 must submit the plan for approval by the commissioner in the form and manner prescribed by the commissioner. One-half the districts must first submit the plan by April 1, 2006, and one-half the districts must first submit the plan by April 1, 2007, as determined by the commissioner.

(b) Programs receiving school readiness funds annually must submit a report to the department.

124D.16 SCHOOL READINESS AID.

Subd. 2. Amount of aid. (a) A district is eligible to receive school readiness aid for eligible prekindergarten pupils enrolled in a school readiness program under section 124D.15 if the biennial plan required by section 124D.15, subdivision 3a, has been approved by the commissioner.

(b) A district must receive school readiness aid equal to:

(1) the number of four-year-old children in the district on October 1 for the previous school year times the ratio of 50 percent of the total school readiness aid for that year to the total number of four-year-old children reported to the commissioner for the previous school year; plus

(2) the number of pupils enrolled in the school district from families eligible for the free or reduced school lunch program for the previous school year times the ratio of 50 percent of the total school readiness aid for that year to the total number of pupils in the state from families eligible for the free or reduced school lunch program for the previous school year.

(c) For fiscal year 2015 and later, the total school readiness aid entitlement equals \$12,170,000.

Subd. 3. Use of aid. School readiness aid shall be used only to provide a school readiness program and may be used to provide transportation. Not more than five percent of program revenue, as defined in subdivision 5, may be used for the cost of administering the program. Aid must be used to supplement and not supplant local, state, and federal funding. Aid may not be used for instruction and services required under sections 125A.03 to 125A.24 and 125A.65. Aid may not be used to purchase land or construct buildings, but may be used to lease or renovate existing buildings.

Subd. 5. **Reserve account.** School readiness revenue, which includes aids, fees, grants, and all other revenues received by the district school readiness programs, must be maintained in a reserve account within the community service fund.
