### 12.14 **357.022 CONCILIATION COURT FEE.**

The court administrator in every county shall charge and collect a filing fee of <u>\$65</u> <u>\$50</u> from every plaintiff and from every defendant when the first paper for that party is filed in any conciliation court action. This section does not apply to conciliation court actions filed by the state. The court administrator shall transmit the fees monthly to the commissioner of management and budget for deposit in the state treasury and credit to the general fund.

### 12.20 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective July 1, 2017.

The court administrator and the sheriff of any county in this state shall perform 12.25 their duties relating to service of process without charge to the petitioner. The court shall 12.26 direct payment of the reasonable costs of service of process if served by a private process 12.27 server when the sheriff is unavailable or if service is made by publication. The court may 12.28 direct a respondent to pay to the court administrator the petitioner's filing fees and reasonable 12.29 costs of service of process if the court determines that the respondent has the ability to pay 12.30 the petitioner's fees and costs. 12.31
